Laughlin noted that revised minutes from the September 21st meeting were distributed to the Council for their review. Sexton questioned the Great Places Grant and what it was for. Laughlin responded and said county wide effort to obtain a grant for a cultural center to be located in Tipton on the north side of town. The grant would also include a cow statue to be placed in each city that would be painted in a mosaic representative of West Branch's past, present and future (similar to the mural project). Laughlin also commented on Resolution 1938 which waives the right for a formal engineer's review for a land split in Oasis between a brother and sister saying that West Branch has no plans for future annexation to west at this time. Stoolman questioned an item from the September 21st claims list for Wellmark adjustments. Edgar explained that the adjustments were for adding a new employee and coverage change for another.

Motion by Sexton, second by Goodweiler approve agenda/consent agenda items. AYES: Sexton, Goodweiler, Miller, Stoolman, Dean. NAYS: None. Motion carried.

PUBLIC HEARING / NON-CONSENT AGENDA

Resolution 1939 - Waiving the Right to a Formal Review of an Extra-Territorial Jurisdiction Subdivision Within Two Miles of the Corporate Limits of West Branch with Conditions – Brookview Ridge. / Move to action. Laughlin explained that this nine lot sub-division will be located approximately one quarter mile east of town on Charles Avenue. He said P&Z had reviewed the preliminary plat at their last meeting and approved waiving the right for a formal review which Laughlin said he supports. Tom Anthony, Shoemaker Haaland, representing Barnhart answered questions from the Council regarding storm water management and other topics related to the draft municipal improvements agreement. Anthony said Cedar County has several, extensive requirements regarding storm water management and septic systems that will be utilized for the subdivision. Anthony added that Cedar County's Phil LaRue was satisfied their preliminary plat and had met all of the county's requirements. Olson suggested that the Council approve a Municipal Development Agreement with the developer, Bruce Barnhart that would require the sub-division to construct public improvements to City standards should the subdivision become annexed by the City as a condition of Resolution 1939. Dean asked Barnhart his feelings on the agreement. Barnhart said his attorney had requested some changes to the agreement but felt those items could be worked out with the City. Olson said he would work with Barnhart's attorney to draft those changes. Motion by Miller, second by Goodweiler to approve Resolution 1939 subject to the signed Municipal Improvements Agreement. AYES: Miller, Goodweiler, Dean, Stoolman, Sexton. NAYS: None. Motion carried.

Discussion: Halloween 2020.

Russell prepared information for the Council to review Halloween safety guidelines due to the COVID-19... Russell stated that trick-or-treating is classified as a 'high-risk' activity but offered some safe ways for the community to celebrate the holiday. The Council said they would not tell residents how they can celebrate a holiday, but was agreeable to providing safety guidelines. The Council set trick-or-treat for Saturday, October 31st from 4 to 8 p.m. for those wishing to participate. Russell said she would have safety guidelines published in the West Branch Times and placed on the city's Facebook pages.

<u>First Reading of Ordinance 777 – An Ordinance Providing that General Property Taxes Levied and Collected Each Year on Lot 26, Cedar Edge Addition, West Branch Iowa, be Paid to a Special Fund for Payment Agreed in Connection with the West Branch Urban Renewal Area. / Move to action.</u>

Olson explained the purpose of the ordinance is to set the value of Little Lights for the TIF Rebate Agreement approved by Resolution 1797 in 2019. Olson said the county has set the value at \$170,220.00 and reminded the Council that the rebate is \$150,000 or 10 years, which occurs first.

Motion by Sexton, second by Goodweiler to approve the first reading of Ordinance 777. AYES: Sexton, Goodweiler, Dean, Stoolman, Miller. NAYS: None. Motion carried.

<u>Discussion: Considering bringing forward a Resolution Approving the of Amount of \$100,000 to be contributed to the West Branch School District over the next five years for the Construction of a Turn Lane Required for the High School Expansion Project.</u>

Staff prepared a reimbursement plan for the City's contribution for a turn lane at the high school due to their expansion project. Jones said the plan would include reimbursing the school \$50,000 in year one (which is a portion of the building permit fees paid by their contractor) and the remaining \$50,000 spread over four years (or \$12,500 per year of general fund dollars). The Council had conflicting opinions on if the City should make the school use a portion of their contingency money for the turn lanes since their expansion is what stemmed the need. The Council was split on who will really benefit from the added turn lane on West Main Street. Laughlin felt that the city's growth on the west side contributes to the traffic on West Main Street, while others disagreed. Jones, who had originally suggested the school use their contingency money before seeking city dollars expressed his concern that a crosswalk light would be an important feature needed for pedestrian traffic safety with the new housing being constructed across street in The Meadows. Jones asked who would pay for that and said those costs had not yet been discussed by either party. Dean and Goodweiler said they would support the City chipping in the \$100,000, but didn't want the school to have to use their contingency money. Miller suggested that the city take on the project

themselves and assess the cost of the road improvements to the adjacent property owners. After much discussion, Dean stated "we are either in, or we are out". The Council did an informal poll on whether or not the contingency language should be put in or left out of the resolution. In the end, the Council was split. Laughlin directed Jones to prepare a resolution for consideration for the next council meeting. Miller added that often the school says they want to be 'partners' but in the past has not held up on their end when the City needed something citing their response "it was not in their facility plans". Miller said he did not want to discuss this matter now, but suggested the Council discuss what kind of partners the city and the school should be in the future.

Discussion: Regarding the Greenview Connection Options.

City Engineer Schechinger presented two concepts for the connection to Greenview subdivision. This project has been on the city's project list for several years and is finally getting close to fruition with the Loethen Ridge Estates subdivision being constructed. Option 1 - a twenty–four foot wide seal coat street comes at a cost of approximately \$55,245.00. This version provides a connection to the edge of the cul-de-sac at the east end of the subdivision. Option 2 – a thirty-one foot PCC street with a price tag of \$239,130.00. This option extends the street further into the subdivision, removing the cul-de-sac and lining up with the natural curve of Greenview Drive. The Council preferred option 2 but wasn't sure how they could afford to do it at this time. The council asked Schechinger if the street could be narrower as a cost saving measure and asked for additional pricing. After further discussions, Laughlin asked Schechinger to provide a third option (similar to Option 1), as a thirty-one foot PCC street, with storm sewer and no sidewalk. Laughlin said the City could then budget the remaining part of the project for FY22. Miller stated that since this project has been on the city's project list for so long, now was not the time to 'take the cheap route' by using the chip & seal option, given that the Council is preparing to give money to the school for their turn lane project. The subject of how the City would pay for the project then prompted a response from Finance Officer Edgar. Edgar said the building permit fee for the school project of \$70,000 could be used (if not given back to the school) and \$59,000 coming from the Cares Act could help fund the project as it goes back to the general fund. Olson said the project will need to go out to bid and would most likely not start until the spring/summer of 2021 which gives the Council and staff more time to determine how to fund the much needed project.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT

Jones reported that the waste water treatment plans have been approved for the IUP which is the first step in the project so funding can be requested from the SRF (State Revolving Loan Fund). The next step will be to have the Council approve an Engineering Service Agreement with V&K for design work on the plan. Jones said that should be ready for the next meeting. Jones advised that Chief Horihan will officially be retire later this month and using vacation to end his employment in November. Horihan's last day on duty will be October 26th. Jones said the recruitment for his replacement will begin sooner than planned.

COMMENTS FROM MAYOR AND COUNCIL MEMBERS

Laughlin said the Lions Club wants to build a shed at the cemetery for them to use as storage. He said it would become City property once constructed. Laughlin asked if the Council would be agreeable to that suggestion. The Council had no objection as long as it was turned over as city property. Olson added that the city would need something in writing to cover the City for insurance purposes. Laughlin said KLM wanted to be on tonight's agenda for the final plat approval but did not meet the requirements of the Chapter 170 by having all improvements completed and approved by the City Engineer. Laughlin said he may call for a special meeting later this week if the escrow requirements are met.

Sexton requested an update on the City's TIF could be held at the next meeting noting that West Branch is not utilizing TIF as much as other cities.

ADJOURNMENT

Motion to adjourn the regular meeting by Miller, second by Goodweiler. Motion carried on a voice vote. City Council meeting adjourned at 9:05 p.m.

PUBLIC HEARING / NON-CONSENT AGENDA

Resolution 1940 – Approving an amendment to that certain Subdivider's Agreement by and between the City of West Branch and KLM Investments, LLC for The Meadows, Part 4, West Branch / Move to action.

Background: Requirements of Chapter 170.19 had not been met by the developer for the October 5th City Council meeting. Because public improvements have not yet been completed, the City requires an Escrow for the remaining improvements in order to approve a final plat. The escrow amount is calculated by the developer's engineer and then approved by the City Engineer. This information was received on October 9th and the meeting was scheduled at the request of the developer as they have lots pending sale before the next regular Council meeting. Because of rezoning changes and re-numbering of lots have occurred after the preliminary plat and Subdivider's Agreement was approved in 2018, the City Attorney is required to make an amendment to the original agreement (Resolution 1742) to reflect those changes.

Jones said due to the timing of the special meeting request and availability to obtain all the necessary information, the proposed amendments for the Subdivider's Agreement were still under review by the City Engineer, City Attorney and developer.

Brick added that Section 14 (of the original agreement) regarding Minimum Low Openings needed verification from both parties engineers and that Section 10 Payment of Sanitary Sewer Connection Fees were under review due to the rezoning that had occurred since the approval of the original agreement.

After some brief discussion, Dean made a motion to approve the amendments pending agreement of the City Attorney and City Engineer on Section 10 and 14.

Motion by Dean, second by Goodweiler to approve Resolution 1940 pending agreement of Section 10 and 14 by the City Attorney and City Engineer. AYES: Dean, Goodweiler, Stoolman, Miller, Sexton. NAYS: None. Motion carried.

Motion by Dean, second by Goodweiler to approve Resolution 1940, amendments to items 1, 2, 3, and 5 as presented. AYES: Dean, Goodweiler, Sexton, Stoolman, Miller. NAYS: None. Motion carried.

Resolution 1941 – Approving the Final Plat for The Meadow's Subdivision Part 4B. / Move to action. Sexton questioned if lots 1 and 30 would have street access from Cedar-Johnson Road or Prairie View Drive since driveways were to be minimized on Cedar-Johnson Road. Mike Welch, Axiom Consultants explained that lot 30 may need to be accessed from Cedar-Johnson due to the width of its north property line. Laughlin agreed that access could be an issue but said this would be addressed at the building permit stage. Stoolman said she would have liked to see Dawson connect to the Greenview subdivision but the Mayor explained that idea was considered previously and determined not to be a viable option. Welch explained that there is a sewer easement and public access between lots 3 and 4 in which the City could provide a pedestrian trail if they so desired to Greenview. Jones confirmed that an escrow check had been received by the City and recommended approval. The Council had no further comments.

Motion by Dean, second by Sexton to approve Resolution 1941. AYES: Dean, Sexton, Miller, Stoolman, Goodweiler. NAYS: None. Motion carried.

On 11-8-2019 there was a close call between a car and a pedestrian during the West Branch High School home football game. This occurred in the close proximity of the concession stand. We have observed the ongoing problem with people in the street waiting in line for concessions and to use the bathroom. Even without those situations, there is an increased pedestrian traffic that would warrant closing off the roadway during the football game. I would recommend closing Oliphant Street, the length of the concession stand during the home West High School Football game. The road would be closed with barricades at that location. There would be signs posted at Orange St and Main Street that would indicated that Oliphant Street is not open to through traffic. (During the Home Football game.) This request is supported by the West Branch Police department and the West Branch Community Schools.

This was first proposed back in 11/2019. The police department held off on this ordinance waiting for the superintendent to get approval from the school board. The West Branch School District has a lot going on. I have been asked to move forward with this proposal. This ordinance will not be in place for most of the upcoming football games, but in the interim, I can close Oliphant under my police authority.

The West Branch Police Department and or the West Branch school district can close Oliphant Street during West Branch home football games (Little Rose Bowl) from the south edge of the concession stand to the north edge of the concession stand. Road closed ahead signs will be placed south of Main Street on Oliphant and Oliphant St. south of Orange St.

Special Event Permit Application

A Facility Reservation form may be required. The City of West Branch may waive the submission deadline in extreme cases of unforeseen events.

Please supply the information requested below. Attach additional sheets, if necessary, to provide the required information. In issuing a permit for a special event, the City considers the following items:

- 1. The event is reasonably likely to cause injury to persons or property, create a disturbance, cause disorderly conduct or encourage or result in violation of the law, or community standards;
- 2. The event will be unreasonably and substantially interrupt the safe and orderly movement of pedestrians and vehicular traffic in the area;
- 3. The proposed location is adequate for the size and nature of the event;
- 4. The event does not unreasonably interfere with the intended use of the area;
- 5. The Applicant's apparent ability to execute the event;
- 6. The Applicant's apparent ability to obtain the appropriate insurance (if applicable);
- 7. The event unreasonably conflicts with other scheduled special events in the community;
- 8. Approvals by other governing agencies; and
- 9. All permit requirements have been met.

The application review process begins when the City of West Branch has received a completed application. Applications for special events must be approved by all appropriate departments, including but not limited to the West Brach Police Department, Fire Department, Public Works, Public Library, Parks and Recreation, Administration, and the City Council. In the event the application is denied by the City; the applicant may appeal to the West Branch City Council in writing within five (5) days of denial. The decision of the West Branch City Council is final.



ORDINANCE 781

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE "TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES" CHAPTER 65 "STOP OR YIELD REQUIRED".

WHEREAS, the West Branch City Council finds it in the best interest of the residents of West Branch to have a stop sign installed on Dawson Drive (north bound) where it intersects with Prairie View Drive and a stop sign installed on Prairie View Drive where it intersects with Cedar / Johnson Road (North, West, approach) in order to provide for the safety of the West Branch Community.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the City Council of the City of West Branch, Cedar County, Iowa:

<u>Section 1. Amendment.</u> The Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by the City Council of West Branch, Iowa by adding the following language to Title, "TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES", Chapter 65, "STOP OR YIELD REQUIRED", Section 65.02, STOP REQUIRED.

- 61. The north bound lane of Dawson Drive to its intersection with Prairie View Drive.
- 62. Prairie View Drive on the north and west approach to its intersection with Cedar / Johnson Road.

<u>Section 2.</u> Conflicts. All ordinances or parts of ordinances not specifically provided for and in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

<u>Section 3. Adjudication.</u> If any section, provision, or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged to be invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

<u>Section 4.</u> <u>Effective Date</u>. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING THAT GENERAL PROPERTY TAXES LEVIED AND COLLECTED EACH YEAR ON LOT 26, CEDARS EDGE ADDITION, WEST BRANCH, IOWA, IN THE CITY OF WEST BRANCH, COUNTY OF CEDAR, STATE OF IOWA, BY AND FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE STATE OF IOWA, CITY OF WEST BRANCH, COUNTY OF CEDAR, WEST BRANCH COMMUNITY SCHOOL DISTRICT, AND OTHER TAXING DISTRICTS, BE PAID TO A SPECIAL FUND FOR PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST ON LOANS, MONIES ADVANCED TO AND INDEBTEDNESS, INCLUDING BONDS ISSUED OR TO BE ISSUED, INCURRED BY SAID CITY IN CONNECTION WITH SAID WEST BRANCH URBAN RENEWAL AREA.

WHEREAS, EMV Holdings, LLC and the City of West Branch entered into that certain development agreement for the construction of a project located on Lot 26, Cedars Edge Addition, West Branch, Iowa (the "Property"); and

Section 2: As to the Property, that portion of the taxes which would be produced by the rate at which the tax is levied each year by and for each of the taxing districts taxing the Property in the West Branch Urban Renewal Area upon the total sum of the assessed value of Property, being the first day of the calendar year preceding the effective date of this Ordinance, that date being January 1, 2019, shall be allocated to and when collected be paid into a fund for the respective taxing district as taxes by or for said taxing district into which all other property taxes are paid. The taxes so determined may be referred to herein as the "base period taxes." The assessed value of the Property on said date, being January 1, 2019 is \$170,220.00.

Section 3: That portion of the taxes each year in excess of base period taxes for the Property shall be allocated to and when collected be paid into the special tax increment fund previously established by the City of West Branch to pay the principal of and interest on loans, monies advanced to, or indebtedness, whether funded, refunded, assumed or otherwise, including bonds issued under authority of Section 403.9 or Section 403.12 of the Code of Iowa, incurred by the City of West Branch, Iowa to finance or refinance, in whole or in part, urban renewal projects undertaken within the West Branch Urban Renewal Area pursuant to the Urban Renewal Plan, as amended.

Section 4: At such time as the loans, monies advanced, bonds and interest thereon and indebtedness of the City of West Branch referred to in Section 3 hereof have been paid, or the City has provided for the division of taxes for a total of twenty (20) fiscal years, whichever is sooner, all monies thereafter received from taxes upon the Property shall be paid into the funds for the respective taxing districts in the same manner as taxes on all other property.

Section 5: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed. In the event that any provision of this Ordinance shall be determined to be contrary to law it shall not affect other provisions or application of this Ordinance which shall at all times be construed to fully invoke the provisions of Section 403.19 of the Code of Iowa with reference to the West Branch Urban Renewal Area and the territory contained therein.

Section 6: This Ordinance shall be in effect after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.





SUBDIVIDER'S AGREEMENT

LOETHEN RIDGE ESTATES, WEST BRANCH, IOWA

This Agreement is made by and between IWB, LLC, an Iowa limited liability company, 2916 Highway 1 North, Iowa City, Iowa 52240, hereinafter referred to as the "Subdivider", and the City of West Branch, Iowa, an Iowa municipal corporation, 110 N. Poplar Street, West Branch, Iowa 52358, hereinafter referred to as the "City".

SECTION 1. MUNICIPAL IMPROVEMENTS; CONSTRUCTION AND INSTALLATION OF MUNICIPAL IMPROVEMENTS.

In consideration of the City approving the Final Plat and subdivision of real estate known and designated as Loethen Ridge Estates, West Branch, Cedar County, Iowa, (legally described on Exhibit "A" attached hereto) and prior to Subdivider's installation and construction of the required municipal improvements, Subdivider shall make escrow provisions as provided herein. Municipal improvements shall include a 29-foot PCC street known as Prairie View Drive and 31-foot PCC streets known as Gilbert Drive and Green View Drive, in locations shown on the Final Plat, said construction also includes the required ADA ramps on panels on streets in the subdivision. In addition to streets, the Subdivider shall construct sanitary sewers, water mains, storm sewers, sump-pump line, storm water detention basin, mail box clusters, street lighting and erosion control/seeding on the private areas of the subdivision. Said municipal improvements shall be constructed and installed in accordance with construction plans and specifications approved by the City Engineer of the City who shall have the right to make or authorize occasional inspections of the work in progress. Said inspections shall not relieve or release the Subdivider from the responsibility to construct the municipal improvements in accordance with the approved plans and specifications.

SECTION 2. SIDEWALKS.

The Subdivider agrees that no later than five (5) years from the date of the City's Resolution approving the Final Plat of Loethen Ridge Estates, West Branch, Cedar County, Iowa, or upon seventy-five percent (75%) of the development of the lots therein, whichever occurs first, to install sidewalks abutting each residential lot which shall be at least five (5) feet wide and constructed according to the plans and specifications as approved by the City Engineer. The escrow provision need not include the sidewalk installation, however, the same shall remain a lien against each lot until accepted and released by the City. Subdivider expressly agrees that as part of the Municipal Improvements, the Subdivider shall be responsible for constructing the sidewalk on the west side of Gilbert Drive and the south side of Prairie View Drive adjacent to Outlot A, since Outlot A is not a buildable lot.

SECTION 3. ESCROW MONIES

In the event that the Subdivider desires to record the Final Plat before the time that the Municipal Improvements are constructed, the Subdivider shall deposit with the City Clerk in escrow an amount equal to the estimated cost of constructing the municipal improvements plus 10% thereof as determined by the City Engineer and said deposit shall be referred to as "Municipal Improvements Escrow". The escrow deposit shall be in the form of cash, bank check that will be cashed, bond or irrevocable letter of credit, all as approved by the City Attorney.

SECTION 4. USE OF ESCROW MONIES

If after one year from the date of the City's resolution approving the Final Plat of the Subdivision, the municipal improvements have not been constructed and installed for the Subdivision, then City may use and/or make demand upon the municipal improvements escrow to construct and install said municipal improvements. The City shall release any bond or letter of credit or refund to the Subdivider any portions of or any excess escrow monies not used by the City after construction, installation and acceptance of all of the municipal improvements. Any cash or check held in escrow shall be released as needed for payment of the costs of the improvements.

SECTION 5. WAIVER

In the event the Subdivider shall sell or convey or make application for a building permit on any lot or lots in the subdivision without having first constructed and installed all the municipal improvements for the Subdivision, then the City shall have the right to proceed therewith as provided in Section 4 above.

SECTION 6. LIEN

The costs of the construction and installation of the municipal improvements shall be a lien and charged against all lots in said Subdivision and need not meet the requirements of notice, benefit or value as provided for by the Code of Iowa for assessing said municipal improvements which may exceed the municipal improvements escrow.

SECTION 7. RELEASE

The City agrees that when all municipal improvements have been constructed and installed for the Subdivision to the satisfaction of the City and upon acceptance by resolution, to furnish the Subdivider a good and sufficient Release for filing in the office of the County Recorder so that this Agreement will not constitute a cloud upon the title of the Lots of the subdivision.

SECTION 8. PUBLIC SERVICES.

Subdivider agrees that public services including, street maintenance, snow plowing, water and sanitary sewer service, will not be provided in the Subdivision until the municipal improvements have been constructed, installed and accepted by the City.

SECTION 9. PAYMENT OF SANITARY SEWER CONNECTION FEE.

Prior to the approval of the Final Plat of Loethen Ridge Estates, the Subdivider shall pay to the City the sum of \$268.30 per residential unit constructed on the Lots in said Subdivision.

Payment of said Sanitary Sewer Connection Fee shall remain a lien against each lot in said subdivision until payment in full and release by the City.

SECTION 10. STORM WATER EROSION CONTROL AND TOPSOIL REQUIREMENTS.

Subdivider or its assigns or successors in interest shall be responsible for the maintenance of appropriate erosion control measures during construction of the infrastructure and during building of any structures in the Subdivision. In addition, the Subdivider shall be responsible for the placement of 4-inches of topsoil or allowed substitute upon each lot after the structures have been constructed prior to the issuance of any occupancy permit for said structure.

SECTION 11. OUTLOT A.

Ownership of Outlot A shall be retained by the Subdivider (or transferred to a Homeowners' Association) and the Subdivider shall maintain said Outlot. In the event that the City determined that repairs and/or maintenance must be performed, the City shall give written notice to Subdivider or the Homeowners' Association, whichever the case may be, and give said entity thirty (30) days to make said repairs unless the repairs constitute an emergency. In the event that the repairs and/or maintenance is not completed, or repairs are needed in an emergency, the City may enter upon said Outlot and perform said repairs and/or maintenance and invoice the Subdivider or Homeowners' Association for the same for payment within fourteen (14) days. In the event that the costs of said repair and/or maintenance are not paid, or if the Homeowners' Association is no longer in existence, the Subdivider expressly authorizes the City to assess the costs of repair and/or maintenance upon each residential unit in said Subdivision equally and the Subdivider hereby waives any requirements for notice, benefit or value for assessing the repair costs against the property in said Subdivision.

SECTION 12. VACATION OF SANITARY SEWER EASEMENT.

The City shall undertake appropriate proceedings necessary to vacate the existing sanitary sewer easement shown on the final plat, said easement being recorded in Book 768 at Page 1, Records of the Cedar County Recorder's Office.

SECTION 13. LOT A.

Subdivider shall prepare and file with the subdivision documents, a Warranty Deed, conveying Lot A to the City of West Branch, the public streets in the subdivision to the City.

SECTION 14. EASEMENTS.

Prior to the approval of the Final Plat of Loethen Ridge Estates, Subdivider shall furnish to the City for recording with the final plat the following easements:

- 1. Public Utility Easement;
- 2. Stormwater and Drainage Easement;
- 3. Storm Sewer Easement

BACKGROUND:

As the High and Middle School Project continues to move forward, certain topics need to be discussed and understandings reached regarding the question of turning lanes and/or other traffic calming measures, a crosswalk; and/or connecting road way on the adjacent high school property.

Based on recent City Council deliberations, staff has devised a funding strategy that directs building permit revenues for year 1. The following years (years 2, 3, 4, and 5) could be either funded through direct expenditures from the general fund or funded through Tax Increment Financing. At these levels the city should not be hampered from some of its larger future projects.

If this proposal is to proceed, the staff still recommends funding annual contribution years 2-5 with the use of Tax Increment Financing to allow fairer distribution of tax exposure. With some of the City Council expressing concerns over the issue of making city contributions subject to the project's use of contingency funds. Staff recommends expanding the contribution to include the other related items of concern... the crosswalk and the related sidewalks that will be needed for pedestrian access.

ENGINEERING SERVICES AGREEMENT

WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS 2021 WEST BRANCH, IOWA

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this _____ day of ______, 2020, by and between the City of West Branch, a Municipal Corporation, hereinafter referred to as the "CITY", and Veenstra & Kimm, Inc., an Iowa Corporation, 860 22nd Avenue, Suite 4, Coralville, IA 52241, hereinafter referred to as the "CONSULTANT."

WHEREAS, the **CITY** desires to construct improvements to the wastewater treatment facility, referred to as the "Project"; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has heretofore deemed it necessary and desirable to obtain professional engineering services for the design of needed improvements; and

WHEREAS, the CONSULTANT is qualified and capable of supplying said engineering services; and

WHEREAS, accordingly, the CITY has agreed to engage the CONSULTANT as an independent contractor to assist in the design and construction of the Project under the terms and conditions set forth below.

NOW THEREFORE, THE CITY AND THE CONSULTANT, FOR CONSIDERATION HEREINAFTER SET FORTH, DO MUTUALLY AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

I. SCOPE OF SERVICES.

The **CONSULTANT** shall perform in a timely and satisfactory manner engineering services in connection with the Project as same are set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated into this Agreement by this reference.

II. TIME OF COMPLETION.

The **CONSULTANT** shall complete the services to be rendered hereunder in accordance with the schedule set forth in Exhibit "B" attached hereto and incorporated by this reference. The **CONSULTANT** does hereby expressly acknowledge and agree that TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE of this Agreement, and, thus, any failure by the **CONSULTANT** to timely render and perform services hereunder shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement.

III. GENERAL TERMS AND PROVISIONS.

- A. The **CONSULTANT** shall not commit any of the following employment practices in connection with or while rendering engineering services hereunder and does hereby expressly agree to prohibit the following practices from being committed by any subcontractors engaged by the **CONSULTANT** in connection with the Project. Upon request, the **CONSULTANT** shall provide the **CITY** with a copy of the relevant provisions of any agreement entered into by the **CONSULTANT** and subcontractor in connection with the Project to confirm to the satisfaction of the **CITY** that the requirements under this Subparagraph III(A) have been met.
 - 1. To discharge or refuse to hire any individual because of their race, color, religion, sex, national origin, disability, age, marital status, or sexual orientation.
 - 2. To discriminate against any individual in terms, conditions or privileges of employment because of their race, color, religion, sex, national origin, disability, age, marital status, or sexual orientation.
- B. The **CITY** may terminate this Agreement, with or without cause, upon no less than seven (7) calendar days written notice. In the event that the **CITY** does so terminate this Agreement, the **CONSULTANT** shall be paid for all work and services performed up to the time of said termination upon submission to the **CITY** of a final billing statement and review and approval thereof by the West Branch City Council at the next regularly scheduled Council Meeting; provided, however, that any such sum shall not be greater than the total amount to be paid for services rendered hereunder as set forth in Article IV below; and further provided that, in the event the **CITY** terminates this Agreement with cause, the **CITY** may, in its sole discretion, elect to withhold payment of an amount sufficient to engage a third party to properly complete the Project in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.
- C. This Agreement shall not be assigned or in any manner transferred by the **CONSULTANT**, without the express written consent of the West Branch City Council.
- D. It is hereby acknowledged and agreed by both parties hereto that the engagement of the **CONSULTANT** by the **CITY** in connection with the Project shall be as an independent contractor and shall be exclusive; provided, however, that the **CONSULTANT** may retain the services of subcontractors for the purpose of performing its obligations and responsibilities under this Agreement so long as the **CONSULTANT** has first obtained the written approval of same from the **CITY**; and further provided that, should the **CONSULTANT** so engage subcontractors under the terms of this Subparagraph III(D), the **CONSULTANT** shall solely responsible for compensating any such subcontractors.

- E. The CITY shall make all criteria, design and construction standards, and information regarding the CITY's requirements for the Project available to the CONSULTANT upon reasonable request by the CONSULTANT therefor. The CITY shall furnish reasonable assistance to the CONSULTANT in the use of said information and documentation at the request of the CONSULTANT.
- F. It is further agreed that neither party to this Agreement shall perform contrary to any federal or state law, rule or regulation, or the West Branch City Code of Ordinances.
- G. At the request of the **CITY**, the **CONSULTANT** shall attend such meetings of the City Council relating to the **PROJECT** hereunder.
- H. The **CONSULTANT** agrees to furnish all reports, specifications, and drawings with the seal of a professional engineer affixed thereto or such other seal as required by State law.
- I. Upon termination of this Agreement and request of the CITY, the CONSULTANT shall provide the CITY with copies of all basic notes and sketches, charts, computations, and any other data prepared or obtained by the CONSULTANT pursuant to this Agreement without cost, and without restrictions or limitations as to the use thereof in connection with the PROJECT. It is understood, however, that the CONSULTANT shall not be liable for the CITY's use of such documents on other projects.
- J. Original drawings prepared by the **CONSULTANT** under this Agreement shall become the property of the **CITY**. The **CONSULTANT** shall be allowed to keep reproducible copies for the **CONSULTANT**'s own filing use.
- K. Fees paid in order to secure approval of authorities having jurisdiction over the Project shall be paid by the **CITY.**
- L. If the **CONSULTANT** is providing Construction Administration or Supervision under this Agreement, the **CONSULTANT** shall make visits to the Project construction site at intervals appropriate to the various states of construction and as mutually agreed to by the **CONSULTANT** and **CITY** in order to observe as an experienced and qualified engineering professional the progress and quality of the various aspects of the work being performed by contractors and/or subcontractors. Based on information obtained during such visits and on such observations, the **CONSULTANT** shall endeavor to determine to the best of the **CONSULTANT**'s ability if work on the Project is proceeding in accordance with the concept plan for the Project and shall keep the **CITY** informed of the progress of the work on the Project and any concerns the **CONSULTANT** may have regarding same.

M. **CONSULTANT** shall furnish the **CITY** with certificates of insurance by insurance companies licensed to do business in the State of Iowa, upon which the **CITY** is endorsed as an additional named insured, in the following limits. It must be clearly disclosed on the face of the certificates that the coverage is on an occurrence basis.

The **CONSULTANT** shall take all necessary steps to preserve the **CITY**'s defenses of governmental immunity under Chapter 670 of the Code of Iowa, including, without limitation, requiring that the language set forth in Exhibit "D" attached hereto and incorporated by this reference be included in the certificate of insurance to be provided to the **CITY** hereunder.

IV. COMPENSATION FOR SERVICES.

The CITY shall compensate the CONSULTANT for engineering services rendered under this Agreement for a fee of Nine Hundred Sixty-Five Thousand and 00/100 Dollars (\$965,000.00). Said fees shall be paid by the CITY to the CONSULTANT in accordance with the payment schedule set forth in Exhibit "C" attached hereto and incorporated by this reference; provided, however, in express acknowledgment that this Agreement is a COMPLETION DATE CONTRACT, the CONSULTANT does hereby acknowledge and confirm the CONSULTANT's understanding that TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE and that the timely completion of each phase of the Project as set forth in Exhibit "A" and the timely completion of the Project in its entirety constitutes material terms of this Agreement without which the CITY would not have engaged the CONSULTANT. Accordingly, the CONSULTANT also acknowledges that:

- A. No payment shall be made to the **CONSULTANT** hereunder if the Project is not proceeding on schedule unless otherwise hereafter agreed in writing by the **CITY**.
- B. Under no circumstances shall the **CITY** compensate the **CONSULTANT** for work that has not yet been completed.

C. In any event, no payment hereunder shall become due and payable until submission to the **CITY** by the **CONSULTANT** of a billing statement therefor and review and approval of the billing statement by the West Branch City Council at its next regularly scheduled meeting.

V. INDEMNIFICATION.

The **CONSULTANT** agrees to fully indemnify, defend, save and hold the **CITY**, its officers, representatives, agents, contractors, subcontractors and employees, harmless from any and all liability to third parties (including reimbursement of reasonable legal fees and costs) arising directly or indirectly from the negligent act, error or omission of the **CONSULTANT**, its officers, representatives, agents, contractors, subcontractors or employees in connection with the Project.

VI. HAZARDOUS MATERIALS.

The **CONSULTANT** hereby warrants and represents that the **CONSULTANT** (i) has not created nor contributed to the creation or existence (ii) nor will it create or contribute to the creation or existence of any type of hazardous or toxic wastes, materials, chemical compounds, or substances, or any other type of environmental hazard or pollution, whether latent or patent, at the premises of the Project, or in connection with or related to the Project. The **CONSULTANT**, notwithstanding the limit of liability contained in Provision V of this Agreement, does hereby fully indemnify, defend, save and hold harmless the **CITY**, its officers, employees and agents from and against any and all debts, claims, causes of action, administrative orders and notices, costs (including but not limited to, response and/or remedial costs), personal injuries, losses, damages, liabilities, demands, interest, fines, penalties and expenses, including reasonable legal fees and expenses, consultants' fees and expenses, court costs and all other out-of-pocket expenses, suffered or incurred by the **CITY**, its officers, representatives, agents, contractors, subcontractors, employees and grantees as a result of any breach of this Provision VI.

VII. INTERPRETATION.

This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with the generally accepted standards of the Engineering Profession; provided, however, that it is expressly understood and agreed by both parties that to the extent, if at all, the explicit terms and conditions of this Agreement are in conflict with said generally accepted standards of the Engineering Profession, said explicit terms and conditions of this Agreement shall control in the event of a dispute between the parties hereto.

VIII. SURVIVAL.

All express representations, indemnifications or limitations of liability made in or given in this Agreement shall survive the completion of the engineering services to be rendered by the **CONSULTANT** hereunder or the termination of this Agreement for any reason.

IX. CONTROLLING LAW.

This Agreement is to be governed by the laws of the State of Iowa. The parties hereto agree that any action, suit or proceeding based upon any matter, claim or controversy arising under this Agreement shall be brought solely in the state courts located in Cedar County, Iowa or the federal courts located in Linn County, Iowa. The parties hereto hereby irrevocably waive objection to the venue of the above-mentioned courts, including any claim that such action, suite or proceeding has been brought in an inconvenient forum. Both parties hereto expressly acknowledge and agree that nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed to require the parties to submit to mandatory arbitration or mediation in the event of a breach or dispute hereunder.

X. HEADINGS.

The headings of sections of this Agreement are for convenient reference only and shall not be deemed to limit, construe, affect, modify or alter the meaning of such sections.

XI. SEVERABILITY.

If any section, subsection, term or provision of this Agreement or the application thereof to the **CONSULTANT**, the **CITY** or a particular circumstance shall, to any extent, be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of said section, subsection, term or provision of this Agreement or the application of same to the **CONSULTANT**, the **CITY** or particular circumstances other than for which it was held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby and each remaining section, subsection, term or provision of this Agreement shall be valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.

- **XII. LEGAL SERVICES**. The **CITY** shall provide the services of a competent Attorney experienced in legal matters pertaining to this type of Project. The **CONSULTANT** shall cooperate with said attorney and shall comply with his requirements as to form of contract documents and procedures relative to them.
- **XIII. CHANGES AND EXTRA WORK**. The above-stated fees cover the specific services as outlined in this Agreement. If the **CITY** requires additional services of the **CONSULTANT** in connection with the Project, the **CONSULTANT** shall receive additional compensation for changes which shall be based upon the standard hourly fees plus expenses of the personnel engaged in the performance of the work.

The method of compensation for authorized Extra Work shall be mutually agreed upon between the **CITY** and **CONSULTANT** at the time the work shall be authorized by the **CITY**.

XIV. AUTHORITY.

The persons signing this Agreement warrant and represent that they have the authority to sign as, or on behalf of, the party for whom they are signing.

XV. FINAL AGREEMENT.

ACCEPTED & AGREED:

Both the **CONSULTANT** and the **CITY** hereby expressly acknowledge and agree that this Agreement is intended to set forth the entire agreement between the parties regarding the engineering services to be rendered by the **CONSULTANT** to the **CITY** in connection with the Project, that there are no other considerations or monies contingent upon or resulting from the execution of this Agreement, and that no other monies or considerations have been solicited. No waiver, change, modification or amendment of this Agreement shall be binding upon either party hereto unless in writing and signed by both the **CONSULTANT** and the **CITY**. The waiver by either party hereto of a breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not operate or be construed as a waiver of any subsequent breach of that provision or of any other provision or condition in this Agreement.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

It is understood and agreed that the Project shall consist of the improvements as described in the Facility Plan including the following:

BASIC SERVICES

The Consultant shall perform in a timely and satisfactory manner engineering services in connection with the **PROJECT** as set forth as follows:

- 1. Topographic and existing utility surveying of the site as necessary for preparation of plans and specifications.
- 2. Attend design conferences with the Owner as may be necessary to make decisions as to the details of design of the project. The Consultant shall make periodic progress reports to the City Council, as necessary.
- 3. Prepare final site layout.
- 4. Consultant shall prepare such preliminary and final plans and specifications as necessary for construction of improvements. The specifications shall describe, in detail, the work to be done, materials to be used and the construction methods to be followed. Preliminary plans and specifications (30% and 60%) shall be submitted to the Owner for review prior to completion of preparation of final plans and specifications. Approximately two weeks of review time is anticipated for review of each set of preliminary plans.
- 5. Consultant shall prepare an estimate of cost for the construction contract. The estimate of cost shall be based on the Consultant's best knowledge at the time of preparation of the estimate of cost. The Consultant shall not be responsible if the construction contract awarded for the Project varies from the Consultant's estimate of cost. The Consultant shall advise and assist the Owner, if necessary, in adjusting the scope and extent of the Project to allow the Project to be constructed within available budget limitations.
- 6. Consultant shall provide copies of the plans and specifications for review by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, FEMA, US Army Corps of Engineers, and any other regulatory agency having jurisdiction over the activities included in the Project. Consultant shall assist in obtaining the necessary construction permits for the Project. Any fees for the construction permits shall be paid by the Owner and said costs shall not be charged against the Consultant's fees.
- 7. Consultant shall assist the Owner in complying with the requirements of the SRF Loan program including application for design services loan. Services by the Consultant shall include coordination of the agency review, public hearing and other preliminary activities necessary to obtain the approval and funding of the Project. Services by the Consultant during design and construction shall include satisfying the requirements of the lowa Department of Natural Resources and obtaining the necessary construction permit. Services during construction shall include providing documentation to the lowa Department of Natural Resources and coordinating Project review and inspection. The Owner shall be responsible for completing the loan documents and for submitting reimbursement requests to the State during construction.
- 8. Consultant shall prepare a scope of work for geotechnical investigation, including soil borings, required during the design phase of the Project. Consultant shall review with the Owner the scope of geotechnical investigation and quotation received from the geotechnical consultant. The Consultant shall coordinate the services of the geotechnical consultant including review of the findings of the geotechnical work and incorporation of the findings in the design of the Project. The actual cost for the

- geotechnical consultant shall be paid directly by the Owner. The cost of the Consultant relating to coordinating and managing the geotechnical services are included as a part of the scope of work under this Agreement.
- 9. Consultant shall prepare a scope of work for independent contractor to evaluate sludge levels in the lagoon cells, including sludge depth, percent solids, and analytical testing for field application. Consultant shall review with the Owner the scope of sludge investigation and quotation received from the biosolids contractors. The Consultant shall coordinate the services of the biosolids contractor including review of the findings of the sampling and testing and incorporation of the findings in the design of the Project. The actual cost for the sampling and analysis shall be paid directly by the Owner. The cost of the Consultant relating to coordinating and managing the biosolids contractor services are included as a part of the scope of work under this Agreement.
- 10. The Consultant shall assist in the preparation of the notice to contractors and shall provide plans and specifications to prospective bidders. Publication cost shall be paid by the Owner.
- 11. The Owner shall compensate the Consultant for the actual cost of the plans and specifications provided to contractors, plan rooms, and suppliers during project bidding. The cost of plans shall be separate from the fee under this Agreement.
- 12. The Project shall be bid at one letting and under one contract. The Consultant shall have a representative present when the bids and proposals are opened and shall prepare a tabulation of bids for the Owner. Consultant shall advise as to the responsiveness of the bidders and assist in making the award of contract. Consultant shall prepare necessary contract documents following award. Consultant shall not be responsible for advising the Owner as to the responsibleness of any bidder.
- 13. The Consultant shall provide general services during construction including:
 - Consultant shall conduct a preconstruction conference attended by representatives of the Owner, Consultant, and contractor to discuss details of the project.
 - b. Consult and advise with the Owner.
 - c. Periodic visits to the site during construction.
 - d. Assist Contractor in interpretation of plans and specifications.
 - e. Review drawings and data of manufacturers.
 - f. Coordinate and review work of testing laboratories for compaction and concrete tests.
 - g. Process and certify payment estimates of the Contractor to the Owner.
 - h. Prepare amendments to the contract documents, as necessary, to show major changes made during construction.
 - i. Provide information as necessary to include the establishment of required benchmarks and baselines for locations, elevations, and grades of construction. Detailed construction staking for the Project shall be performed by the Contractor.
- 14. Consultant shall make a final review after construction is complete to determine that the construction is substantially in compliance with the plans and specifications. The Consultant shall certify to the Owner that construction is substantially in compliance with the plans and specifications.

- 15. Consultant shall provide the Owner with two (2) complete sets of plans showing final construction. Information on details determined in the field during construction will be incorporated on the final plans in accordance with information furnished by the construction reviewer, the Owner, and the Contractor. As built drawings are based on the best available information and are not verified for accuracy.
- 16. Construction Observation and Resident Review services are understood to include the detailed observation and review of work of the Contractors and materials to assure compliance with the plans and specifications. The consultant shall provide resident review services by assigning resident engineers and/or engineering technicians to the Project for such periods reasonably required to ensure proper review of the construction work. On-site review shall take place on a part time basis during the construction work on the Project.
- 17. Compliance with SRF record keeping including review of contractor pay rolls and wage interviews associated with Davis-Bacon wage verification and documentation of materials for American Iron & Steel compliance during construction.
- 18. Owner shall provide the services of the City Attorney in matters pertaining to this Project. The Consultant shall cooperate with the Owner's attorney and shall comply with his/her requirements as to form of contract documents and procedures relative to them.

SERVICES NOT INCLUDED

The following is a partial list of services not included under this Agreement:

- 1. Soil borings, geotechnical investigation, compaction testing and contaminated soil investigations are not included in this Agreement.
- 2. Environmental studies, archaeological investigation, and wetland determinations are not included in this Agreement.
- 3. Services related to or regarding arbitration or litigation of a construction contract between a construction contractor and the Owner regarding any of the projects included in this Agreement.
- 4. Topographic survey beyond that previously identified in the scope of work is not included in this Agreement.
- 5. Legal surveys to identify property boundaries are not included in this Agreement.
- 6. Materials testing and inspections other than those completed as part of the resident review on the site of the Project are not included in this Agreement.
- 7. Services required for the evaluation of and determination to accept defective work by Contractor including required re-design services.
- 8. Services required for re-design as a result of substitute products during the construction phase.
- 9. Services required as a result of Owner providing incomplete or incorrect Project information.
- 10. Construction staking.

- 11. Assistance in connection with bid protests, rebidding or renegotiating contracts for construction, materials, equipment, or services, only so long as the original work is reasonably consistent with Owner's program or other instruction.
- 12. Providing assistance in resolving any Hazardous Environmental Condition in compliance with current laws and regulations.
- 13. Noise and/or odor studies.
- 14. Biosolids survey, sampling or testing.
- 15. Preparation of more than one bid package.
- 16. Meetings and negotiations with property owners.
- 17. Services associated with pilot testing of alternative treatment systems or evaluation of data obtained from pilot testing.

The schedule milestones for this project are as follows:

- 1. Kickoff Meeting by November 1, 2020.
- 2. Topographic Survey by November 27, 2020.
- 3. Preliminary plans and specifications (60% complete) for City review by May 1, 2021.
- 4. Preliminary plans and specifications (90% complete) for City review by July 1, 2021.
- 5. Final construction plans and specifications shall be delivered by August 1, 2021.
- 6. Submittal of the IDNR Construction Permit shall be completed by August 1, 2021.
- 7. Anticipated bid date for the project is September 15, 2021.
- 8. Anticipated project award by October 1, 2021.
- 9. Project substantial completion is to be scheduled for November 2022.

The **CONSULTANT** shall not be responsible for delays in approval or other actions by governmental agencies or by delays in obtaining easements which may delay the time of completion for services.

COMPENSATION FOR SERVICES:

The **CITY** shall compensate the **CONSULTANT** for engineering services rendered under this Agreement based on the following:

- 1. For **DESIGN SERVICES**, the lump sum fee of Five Hundred Eighty-Three Thousand Dollars (\$583,000);
- 2. For **GENERAL SERVICES**, the lump sum fee of Two Hundred Twenty-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$228,000);
- 3. For **RESIDENT REVIEW**, the estimated fee of One Hundred Forty-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$148,000); based on providing 1,800 hours of review time at \$80/hour, plus direct expenses.
- 4. For **SRF Record Keeping**, the estimated fee of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000); based on providing 110 hours of review time at \$57/hour, plus direct expenses.

Said total fees shall be paid by the **CITY** to the **CONSULTANT** shall become due and payable until submission to the **CITY** by the **CONSULTANT** of a billing statement therefor and review and approval thereof by the West Branch City Council at the next regularly scheduled Council Meeting.

WHEREAS, the City received a new National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit for the wastewater treatment facility that includes a compliance schedule to update the facility to meet more stringent effluent limits; and

WHEREAS, The City has approved an engineering service agreement through Resolution 1728 with Veenstra & Kimm, Inc of Coralville, Iowa for submitting and getting approved a facility plan as required by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR); and

WHEREAS, The City of West Branch has received a proposal from Veenstra & Kimm, Inc. for the design of needed improvements related to the West Branch wastewater treatment facility; and

WHEREAS, The City of West Branch has adopted an incremental step rate system that has begun the process of raising funds for the costly process of making the aforementioned wastewater treatment facility improvements; and these funds are projected to have raised \$120,000 by February 2021; and

WHEREAS, The City will apply for an zero percent (0%) Planning and Design Loan January 3rd 2021 for the 100% of the Planning and Design expenses; and

WHEREAS, this Loan once construction has been concluded will be wrapped into the State Revolving Fund (SRF) construction loan; and

WHEREAS, The City has a financial strategy to pay the amount of \$965,000 for the base engineering services needed for the design of improvements related to the West Branch Wastewater Treatment Facility; and these engineering services are deemed appropriate and are reasonably related to the purpose for which such fees are charged.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of West Branch that the Engineering Service Agreement for the Design of needed improvements related to the West Branch Wastewater Treatment Facility.

BACKGROUND:

The budget is the City's financial plan for the upcoming fiscal year. Because it determines the level of City Services and the way in which these services will be funded, it stimulates much debate about the role of government. The Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) contains all the individual capital projects, equipment purchases, and major studies for a local government; in conjunction with construction and completion schedules, and in consort with financing plans. The plan provides a working blueprint for sustaining and improving the community's infrastructures. It coordinates strategic planning, financial capacity, and physical development. A CIP stands at the epicenter of a government's Planning, Public Works, and Finance departments.

There are two major part to a CIP:

- 1. The Capital Improvement Program The capital program is a plan for capital expenditures that extends typically five to ten years beyond the capital budget.
- 2. The Capital Improvement Budget The capital budget is the upcoming year's spending plan for capital items

We will start with developing the program. The following should be considered as a starting point. City Council are encourage to come with their own list. Budgeting and Funding strategies come in later sessions.
